The next second session which will focus on Forgiveness and Trauma healing is to begin on 18<sup>th</sup> April, but with the current challenge of COVID 19 (coronavirus), we are not sure if this training will be held. Let us continue to pray for these pastors that they stand firm, especially when churches, schools and big social gatherings have been shut down for the time of the pandemic. However, PHARP is doing follow-up via phone calls, so as to know the well-being of these participants.

On March 21<sup>st</sup>: This day, the pastors from Kibera slum visited with PHARP team with the main focus of prayer for the ministry and for all staff. *Rev. Anyango who was leading the team, first came in contact with PHARP in 2007 when there was the heightened post-election violence in Kenya. He was undergoing some trauma counseling as he had been displaced.* It is through this long period of friendship with the PHARP director and the ministry, that he saw it fit to rally pastors and come pray with the PHARP team.

Pastors gave testimonies of how God has seen them through hard times. Hard times of health, family and even ministry. One pastor shared how he had been sick for 8 years, but through faith, he declared his healing. Now its over 40 years since he has been sick. The foods that he was not able to eat because of his health, he now eats comfortably. As we speak now am above 65 years. God has renewed his strength and youth.

Pastor Simon shared a concern of how the world is full of darkness. Looking at the wars, the pandemics, corruption and innocent deaths happening all over. This state of not knowing the

things of God is out of ignorance by those in the church. He was grateful that through PHARP, community members are being empowered and enlightened.

Many pastors' forums are splitting and this is attributed to leadership greed and ignorance; but we are grateful to PHARP that seeks to bring together community and religious leaders to work together for the good of the community. We should therefore stand firm and courageous; we shall be victorious.

In line to the above testimony, Pastor Maurice added that in the past years within Kibera slum, pastors have been working individually. So, this has contributed to so many tired church workers. Something that we learnt in discipleship and which opened my eyes on how to work with a team.

Since working together in a pastors' forum, we are finding relief and being empowered for effective ministry. We have to be prepared all the time for we do not know when Christ shall come.

Pastor Alois finished by giving an illustration of a chicken. Back in our village during planting time, chickens are usually tied on a tree by a rope so that they don't roam in the maize and beans cereals to scatter and eat them. After the three-month period of harvesting and drying, the chickens tied are let loose. But you find that, because the chicken has been accustomed to being tied and moving within the radius the rope reaches, it forgets that it has been set free. As Christians and pastors ministering in the slum, may our thinking be like these chickens. PHARP and tSOAR- USA are investing in our ministries with knowledge and skills; let us not stick to the old ways of doing ministry that are not yielding results.
